#### Introduction

- Commitment is defined as "an agreement or pledge to do something in the future" or "the state or an instance of being obligated or emotionally impelled" (Merriam-Webster's Collegiate Dictionary).
  - a. Often this term is used to describe relationships including marriage.
  - b. Vows are exchanged in the marriage ceremony pledging love, support, care, and priority to the other person.
- 2. Christianity demands commitment because it is a relationship between the church (composed of individual members 1 Cor. 12:12-14) and Christ.
  - a. Christ is the husband and the church is His bride (2 Cor. 11:2; Rm. 7:4; cf. Eph. 5:22-32; Rev. 19:7-9).
- 3. The quality of commitment to any cause can be measured by three basic standards: duration, intensity, and priority.
  - a. **Duration** refers to how long a person is willing to give unreserved love and support to another.
  - b. **Intensity** refers to the strength of feeling and depth of concern for the partner.
  - c. **Priority** describes the extent to which the relationship takes precedence over other matters.

### I. Committed to Christ: Duration

- 1. God loved us first (1 Jn. 4:9-10, 19).
  - a. Sending the Christ was in God's mind from eternity (Eph. 3:9-11).
- 2. Christ loved and loves the church (Eph. 5:25-32).
  - a. Marriage to Christ takes place at baptism (Ac. 2:41, 47).
  - b. We show our love to Christ by obeying Him (Jn. 14:15, 21, 23-24).
- 3. Christ demands faithfulness for the remainder of our lives (Rev. 2:10).
  - a. Like in marriage, it is possible to become unfaithful (2 Cor. 11:1-4).

# **II. Committed to Christ: Intensity**

- 1. Our strength of feeling and depth of concern for Christ is determined by how much of our heart He has.
  - a. He desires it all (Mk. 12:29-34).

- b. If Christ has all of our hearts we will not make excuses when it comes to serving Him.
- c. Consider Epaphroditus (Php. 2:25-30).
- 2. It is possible to lose intensity.
  - a. The Ephesians did (Rev. 2:4-5).
  - b. The Laodiceans did (Rev. 3:14-16).

## **III. Committed to Christ: Priority**

- 1. Christ is preeminent (Col. 1:18).
  - a. This means He is above all.
  - b. He has superiority and thus highest priority.
- 2. Christ must come before all others including self and all things (<u>Lk. 14:25-33</u>; cf. <u>Lk. 9:57-62</u>).
  - a. "hate not" (Lk. 14:26) means to love less (Mt. 10:37).
  - To put anyone or anything ahead of Christ is to not be worthy of Him (<u>Mt.</u> <u>10:37-39</u>).
  - c. We seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness (Mt. 6:33).

### Conclusion

- 1. To be committed to Christ requires a lifelong relationship just like marriage.
- 2. To be committed to Christ requires us to give Christ our whole heart.
- 3. To be committed to Christ means that He will take priority over all others and all things.
