Introduction

- 1. Nowhere in the Gospel records of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John will you find the title words explicitly stated by Jesus.
 - a. This should not surprise us (Jn. 21:25; cf. Jn. 20:30-31).
 - b. The inspired apostle Paul remembered these words of the Lord Jesus as he spoke to the Ephesian elders at Miletus (Ac. 20:16-17).
- 2. The context shows the need to work so that the weak can be supported (Ac. 20:35).
 - a. labouring (*kopiao* G2872 verb) "to labor with wearisome effort, to toil…of bodily labor" (Thayer 355).
 - b. weak (*astheneo* G770 verb) "to be weak in means, needy, poor" (Thayer 80).
 - c. to support (*antilambano* G482 verb) "to take someone's part by assisting, take part, come to the aid of" (BDAG 89).
 - d. The American Standard Version (ASV) brings to the surface the fact that Paul left them an example of this very behavior.
 - e. This is the same sentiment as taught in Ephesians 4:28 where it is connected with giving for those in need.
- 3. While Acts 20:35 certainly applies to giving to the needy, we gain great benefits from giving in general.

I. Being Blessed

- 1. An examination of the word "blessed" in an English dictionary reveals several definitions (Merriam-Webster's Collegiate Dictionary):
 - a. "held in reverence: venerated," "honored in worship: hallowed," or "beatific."
 - b. "of or enjoying happiness specifically: enjoying the bliss of heaven."
 - c. "bringing pleasure, contentment, or good fortune."
- 2. In the New Testament, we first encounter the word "blessed" in the beatitudes (Mt. 5:3-11).
 - a. Blessed (makarios G3107 adjective) found 50 times in the New Testament.

- b. Various definitions for this Greek word exist but they all include or allude to the idea of "happy" or "happiness."
- c. If we take the definition of "happy" and substitute it for "blessed" in Acts
 20:35 we get "It is more **happy** to give than to receive."
- d. We now have a connection with our happiness and giving.

II. Heavenly Happiness

- 1. It has been said that, "He is no fool who gives what he cannot keep to gain what he cannot lose."
- 2. Our treasures must be laid up in Heaven (Mt. 6:19-21).
 - a. Our goal in life is not "to die with the most toys."
 - b. The Earth and everything in it is temporary and fleeting (2 Cor. 4:18).
 - c. To have Heavenly happiness we must be storing our treasures in Heaven.
 - d. The only way to do that is to give and it starts with self (2 Cor. 8:5).
- 3. The love of money produces only sorrow and destruction (<u>1 Tim. 6:9-10</u>).
 - a. The unhappiest person and the most self-centered person are one and the same.
 - b. The remedy to this problem? A good start would be to get **out** of self and **give** to others.

Conclusion

- 1. This month our focus will continue to be on giving and the great lessons we can learn from the Bible about it.
- 2. We rob ourselves of happiness when we turn our focus solely inwardly instead of helping others.
- 3. The Lord has blessed us so that we may bless others (cf. <u>Jm. 1:17</u>).
